OPENING DOORS

I am excited by the initiative in Guatemala and am glad the Abbey has been able to join the project. I am fortunate to have been able to visit Esquipulas several times over the years, since the monastery there is a

member of the same congregation as Subiaco. Padre Hugo is a friend of mine and has shown me his school.

The Sisters of St. Scholastica are doing something very special for the girls in Esquipulas. They are not simply giving them some more options for their lives. <u>Those girls have no op-</u><u>tions</u>. You saw the statistics on the slides. They are blocked on all sides. What they need is for someone to open a door for them and that is what the Sisters are doing. They have given them the key to open a door so they can walk out to other life possibilities.

The girls are talented and motivated, but they need help. When they get help to open that door, the possibilities are just beginning. You saw that one of them is planning to be an attorney. Think about what a female attorney might do for human rights in Guatemala, especially one who comes from the hopeless situation these girls were born into. Female attorneys are rare in that culture, but female attorneys with the background of these girls are practically non-existent.

The Sisters are doing a wonderful thing. Religious communities in this country have their own problems, and we may too often look to our own needs and not look too far beyond. I am very proud of the Sisters for looking beyond themselves and even to a different country, Guatemala, and to a different culture. They are making a difference. They are opening a door for the young girls of Esquipulas, who otherwise have to stand before a closed door, helpless, with no way to go through into the light. The Sisters are saving lives. They are doing something for us, too. They are offering us a chance to help them open that door for those beautiful young girls.
